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EDITORIAL

The year under review has been a somewhat uneventful and in some ways a rather disappointing one. Only 14 Sargodhians joined the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, in 1963, as compared with 17 in 1962. This was partly due to the fact that we had a comparatively small entry for the Senior Cambridge Examination in 1962; but the I.S.S.B. was also responsible, for it deferred a number of boys who should certainly have been taken. As long as the present system of selection continues, the P.A.F. will certainly not get all it should out of the School. Boys who are deferred when less deserving and less mature candidates are taken cannot be blamed for having a grievance and losing interest.

Perhaps the most satisfactory feature of the year was the exceptionally good performance of the Ex-Sargodhians at Risalpur. None has been terminated or relegated in the past year. In both Courses which joined Risalpur in 1963 a Sargodhian topped the Entry Test and all were well-placed. In the 1963 December tests the top Cadet in each Course was from this School, and a Sargodhian won the Ground Subjects Trophy at the Passing Out Parade in January, 1964. The two Cadets selected at Risalpur for training abroad were both ours.

Gliding has had a record year, more boys getting their 'Wings' than ever before. We are indeed lucky to have this valuable and fascinating pastime at the School, and we are duly grateful to Air Headquarters for providing this facility.

Academically we are certainly living up to our motto 'Aim High'. We no longer send our weaker students in for the Matriculation, but every boy has to take the Senior Cambridge Examination. This means hard work on the part both of the teachers and the boys but it pays good dividends. A Senior Cambridge boy is academically well ahead of a matriculate and fares far better at Risalpur.

In October, 1963, we had to bid farewell to Kazi Zahiruddin, who retired to become Principal of the Cantonment Public School, Peshawar. He was one of the oldest members of the Staff, having been here for some 10 years as Islamiyat teacher. During this time he had won the respect and affection of colleagues and boys alike, and his departure has left a gap which it will be hard to fill. We wish him every success in his new assignment.

We wish to congratulate Mr. Rehman Quraishi, Head of the Science Department, on topping the course for the Certificate of Education at Southampton University in 1963. We also congratulate Mr. Naqvi on getting his Ph.D. in Urdu, and Mr. Shafqat Hussain on adding an M.A. Degree in Urdu to his M.A. in English.

Finally, congratulations to Sabre on winning the Inter-House Competition for the Chigwell Shield for the first time in the School's history. They thoroughly deserved their victory.

ACADEMICS

Senior Cambridge and G.C.E. Examination, November, 1962

For the first time since 1958, we decided to change our policy of sending weak students in for the Matriculation Examination and perhaps somewhat optimistically sent all in for the joint Senior Cambridge and G. C. E. Examination. The reason for our doing so was that Matriculates fare poorly at Risalpur compared with those who have taken the Senior Cambridge Examination, which is of a far higher standard. Inevitably the result fell below that of previous years. Of our 16 candidates, 10 gained School Certificates, 4 passed the G. C. E., and 2 failed.

Although a Sargodhian has not won the Sword of Honour since January, 1963, Waleed (280S) commanded the Passing Out Parade in August, and Akmal was runner-up for the Flying Trophy. When the 37th Course passed out in January, 1964, Najmi (243F) won the Ground Subjects Trophy and Siraj was runner-up for the Flying Trophy.

The Sargodhians in the 38th Course have done exceptionally well. Of the original 10 in the Course, Safi (356T) and Tariq (288S) have been selected for training in the U.S.A. Only two, Mushtaq and Saqlain, failed to make the flying grade and have been transferred to C & R. The rest are still at the College and in the December, 1963 Tests, they secured the top four positions. Incidentally, in these Tests a Sargodhian came top of each Course—Najmi (37th Course), Maqsood (38th), Nazim (39th) and Muqet (40th). It is particularly encouraging to be able to record that no Sargodha boy was relegated or terminated in 1963.

Sargodhians have also been distinguishing themselves at sports. Zahid and Mushtaq played cricket for the P.A.F., the former scoring 170 against the Navy. He is Captain of the College Cricket XI. RISALPUR REMINISCENCES

The very mention of Risalpur brings to my mind a series of pleasant experiences and memories. I can well recall the day I first entered the College with mixed feelings of joy and fear. I had heard many stories about the ragging of the juniors by the seniors. But to my surprise I found myself surrounded by a friendly lot of seniors many of whom were old school-fellows—and a few not so friendly-looking seniors, who gave us 'dirty looks' but nothing more. Later a senior confided to me that this change was the result of an order from the Commandant forbidding ragging. This was pleasant news indeed. Very soon I was getting to know the ropes better.

The next thing I can recall is the parade square. It all started with "one-two, three-one" and ended with "final term, inwards wheel, slow march". The parade square itself was only a flat cemented ground, but what made it so unforgettable were the people associated with it. There was Flt./Lt. Bhatti, our G.S.T.O., always ready with a sharp word if you asked for it, and various other drill instructors who are difficult to forget.

Next I find myself in the directorate going from class to class learning altogether new subjects, which were not difficult to grasp if one remained attentive in the class—which very few did. Some of the topics, however, were rather dry. The atmosphere in the classroom was friendly and the instructors very helpful.

We felt great when we first wore our uniform. We often went out of our way to salute someone and counted full five steps before bringing the hand down. Meanwhile certain seniors in the mess started what can be called mild ragging. They shouted a lot, though they hardly ever gave any physical punishment. This gradually increased in magnitude and finally, one evening, we were surprised to find the Commandant and practically all the other officers who were responsible for the administration of the Cadets' wing. An assembly of the junior term was held and with immediate effect all powers of punishments were withdrawn from the seniors and the Cadet NCO's. The rest of the term passed without any special incident. We proudly presented arms to the Passing Out Term in our first graduation parade and dreamed of the day when our turn would come.

The second term passed much quicker than I had expected—at least I felt it did. We became familiar with more people like the 'Ustad' of the riding school, 'Flight Right', our P.T. instructor, and the officer-like flight of the G.T.U.

At last the long-awaited third term came and with it we started flying. We were all very excited about it and the Cadets' Crew Room was crowded with us. At last, after weeks of lectures on aircraft systems and procedures, we began our regular flying. The morning emergency sessions, the checks, procedures, briefs and de-briefs

became routine matters. Soon the course started thinning down and we started missing many of our colleagues. Each one of them had left an impression on my mind.

I cannot forget the day I got my first solo on the Harvard. It was a nice clear morning and I was making unusually smooth landings. Flt./Lt. Hall stepped out after 'check sortie' and jokingly told me that he would put it in my Mess Bill if I damaged the aircraft. The good old Harvard, notorious for swings on landings, soon got tamed. The various phases of flying, including Instrument Flying, Navigation, Formation Flying and Night Flying were very interesting, especially the last two. It was a wonderful experience to fly at night with the stars and moon as your only companions.

The final term had its own charms, but we were too busy to enjoy it. We were worried about the various flying tests. However, after passing them, we realized how foolish we had been to be scared of them. The constant encouragement of the flying instructors was greatly responsible for our success.

There are hundreds of other things and people that I keep remembering at odd hours. There was "Chachoo" in the dining hall, the old, energetic No : I bearer who annoyed nobody ; and then we had "Maulana" in the tea bar and many others whom one came across quite often.

You cannot expect me to forget the graduation parade. I remember every bit of it. The feelings that I had cannot be described on paper. One has actually to pass out of the college to understand them.

OFF TO THE STATES

The 25th of January, 1964, made history for me. I was off to the States.

The Karachi International Airport had a very dull and dry atmosphere. The passengers' lounge was practically empty except for a few sleepy South Koreans travelling on to Austria for some athletic meet. I cleared the various formalities inevitable in international travel and boarded the PAN AM Boeing ready to fly on to Beirut.

During the initial part of the travel, I felt that PAN AM had earned itself a name which it did not really deserve. The service was not as courteous as it was reputed to be, nor was the flight as smooth as advertised. However, in the later stages of the journey, I was fairly convinced of the justification of their claims.

The city of Beirut looked beautiful from the air, as, I hope, it is. However, I could not form any clear impression of Beirut Airport because of lack of time. I had just enough time to disembark from the plane, go down to the transit lounge, get my tickets checked and board the connecting plane. We did not continue our flight in the same aircraft because it took a longer route and thus a longer time to reach New York. However, by changing planes at Beirut, we got about five hours at New York, more by chance than by choice. The connecting plane at New York was delayed by three hours.

After another hop of about four hours or so, we were at Rome. The flight from Beirut to Rome was over the Mediterranean Sea. I thought I saw Cyprus but I am not sure whether it was Cyprus or some other island. There were mountains on our right, probably the Taurus range along the North and North-East coasts of the Mediterranean Sea. Whatever they may have been, they looked very beautiful. The sunlight falling on the snow-capped peaks produced a very soothing crimson shade, and the deep blue water underneath added to the beauty of the scene.

I was greatly impressed by the airport at Rome, for this was the best, the biggest and the most beautiful airport I had seen till then. I remember I praised it vastly in the picture post-cards which I sent home—of course, before I saw Orly Airport, Paris.

The flight between Rome and Paris was of a short duration—just about an hour and a half. I remember flying over the Alps, seeing the snow-capped Mont Blanc and many other peaks. It was really beautiful. The crimson shade was much more pronounced. It seemed as if we were flying over one of the Poles.

While Beirut and Rome had bright sunshine and pleasant weather, Paris was cold and foggy. The fog was so thick that we could not see the Eiffel Tower even. It had just stopped snowing and a cold breeze blew. However, we were lucky not to have a long distance to walk from the aircraft to the lounge. Probably if the distance had been greater, we should have been transported by bus.

Orly Airport, Paris, seemed far superior to Rome Airport, as I think it is. Not only was it bigger, better and, of course, more beautiful but it also had the French daintiness attached to it. Escalators and elevators were widely used; as were TV sets for making announcements. I remember I felt rather queer when I first used the escalator and I felt Man was not making the proper use of the physical capabilities given to him by God; but when I saw the TV sets, the electronic clocks and many other things, I felt he was justified. It is much more satisfying to exert the brain than the body.

After a short stop at Paris, where some people believed we were from Kuwait, we were ready to take off for our longest hop of seven and a half hours. Our next stop was to be New York.

As it was getting fairly late according to the W.P.S.T., I had started feeling sleepy. Although I had slept for most of the past journey, I again went to sleep and slept so soundly that I missed my dinner and other refreshment. However, I preferred sleep to anything else then.

John F. Kennedy Airport, New York, was gigantic, far surpassing both Rome and Paris airports. No wonder the Americans are anxious to keep away from war for it would be a real pity to hear of a bomb being dropped at this airport and learn of the destruction of such a fine piece of architecture.

Innumerable airlines have their terminals at New York. All the companies have their own separate terminals but as all these are adjacent to each other, they combine to form a really huge airport.

After waiting for five long hours at New York, during which period we could not see anything but the airport area, we were finally ready to take off for San Antonio. We had short stops at Washington, Atlanta and Houston before we landed at San Antonio International Airport after a flight of about six hours. As I was asleep when we landed at Washington and Atlanta, I could smell the cool, winter air at Houston only.

By the time we landed at San Antonio, the sun had come out (and it must have gone down in Pakistan by then). We were driven down to Lackland Air Force Base, which is about twenty miles from San Antonio Airport. Thus came the end of our 12000 mile and 36 hour journey.

SABRE HOUSE REPORT

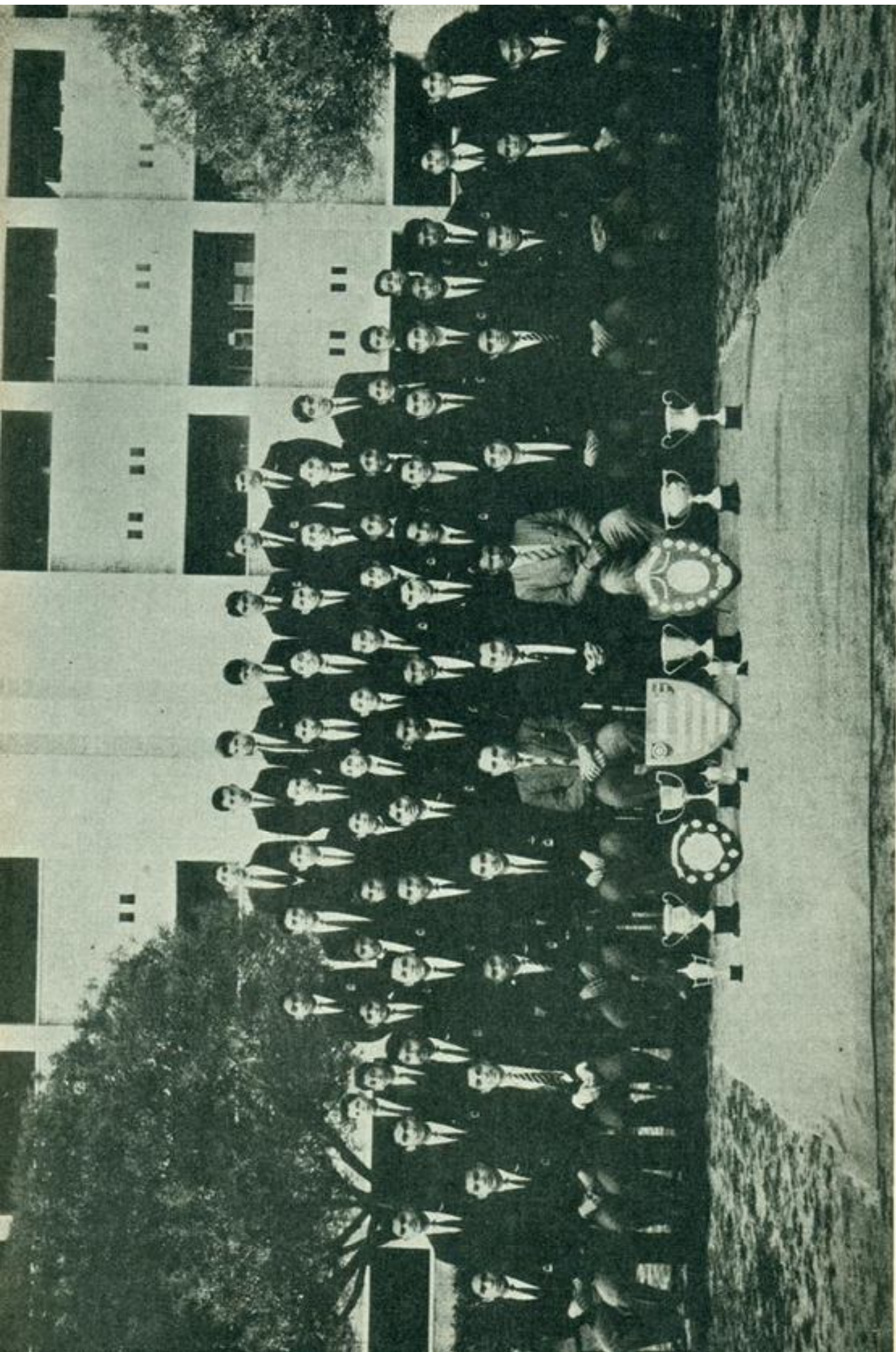

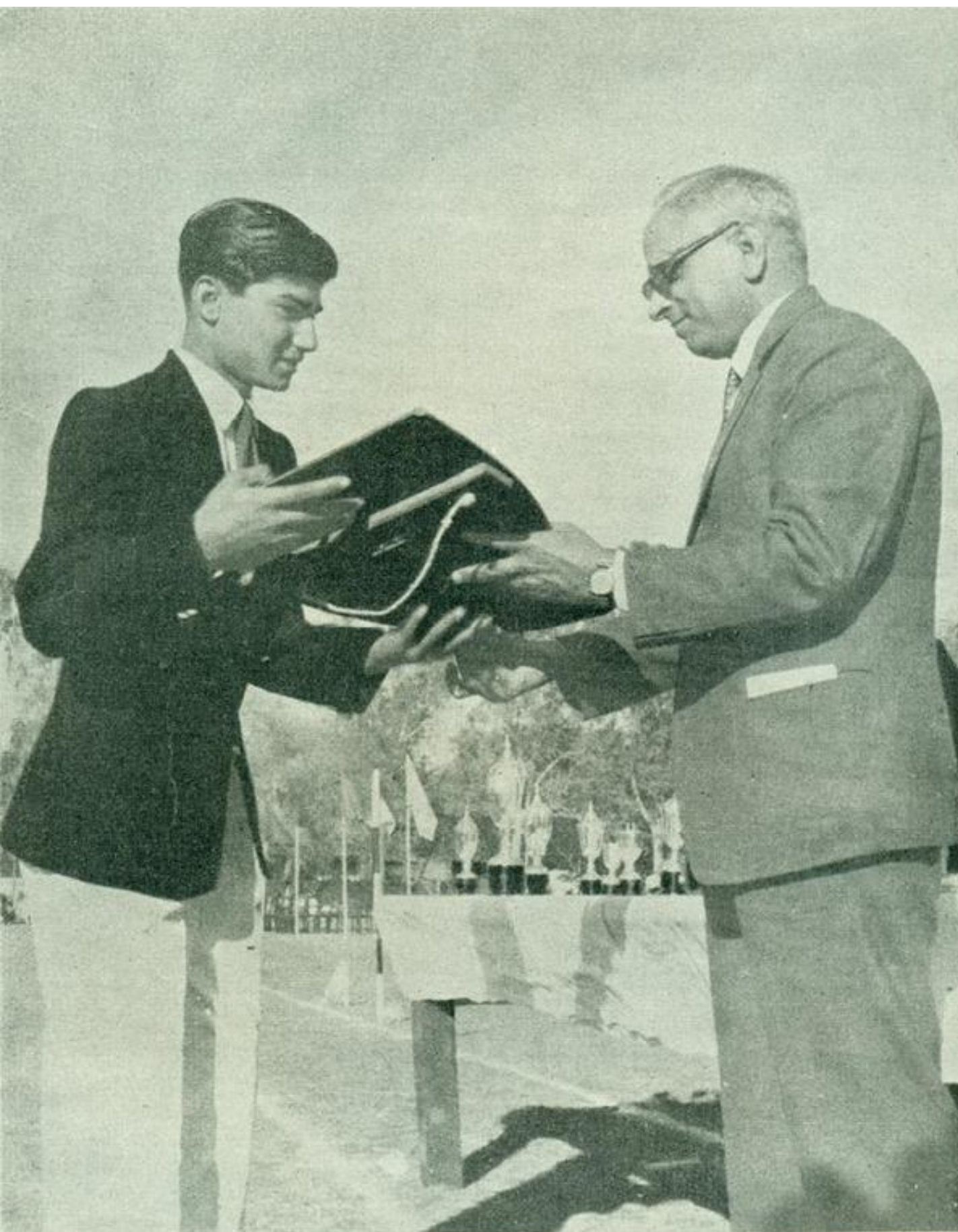
The year began with a series of successes. The first trophy to be bagged by Saberites was the Cricket Cup. The Seniors remained unbeaten, thanks mainly to Shafique, Haroon and Yousaf, while Zaki, Meezan and Shahid were outstanding in the Juniors. In debating we had to be satisfied with second position. Our Senior debaters, Shafique (369) and Nasir (428), did very well but they did not get enough support from the Junior speakers.

Our lead over our opponents in the Indoor Games Competition was overwhelming. Khalid Mahmood (458) became the School Champion in Table Tennis, while Daud (440) was the Draughts Champion, besides being unbeaten in Table Tennis. We had the maximum number of unbeaten champions, others being Meezan, Mansoor, Mumtaz, Afzal, Mahboob, Shakeel, Saleem, Jamal, and Asad. At Basketball, however, we were up against very strong opposition from Fury House, but thanks to the spirited performance of the seniors, with adequate support from the juniors, we were able to secure this trophy as well. But at Swimming the poor performance of the past years was repeated and we were last although we can at least boast that we had no non-swimmer.

The second term started with a sweeping victory in Football, our Senior and Junior teams both being unbeaten. This was followed by another victory at Hockey. The Senior team, under the captaincy of Daud, played very well and remained unbeaten, while the juniors lost only to Fury.

The standard of the whole School at P.T. and Gymnastics, as well as Drill, has been very high this year. Our positions were not very good in these Competitions. It is surprising that we should lose Gymnastics every year in spite of having Mr. Ali Sher as our P.T.I. We are, however, indebted to Mr. Noor Mohammad for the pains he has taken to train the boys at all games and especially at Boxing in which our standard has become much higher. We had every chance of coming first in this competition if the heavier weights had not been abolished.

The year closed with a very decisive victory in Athletics, and Majeed (572) created a new school record in 400 metres junior race. Arman Habib (594) was declared the best junior athlete, and Haroon the second best senior athlete.

Old Saberites are doing very well. Tariq (288) has left Risalpur for training in the States. Solat, Bakht Bedar, Ehtesham and Saiful are doing well at Risalpur. We were glad to have them in the House on Founder's Day, as well as Saleem Ishaq from the Pakistan Military Academy, Shafique (335) from Government College, Lahore, and Rabnawaz, who is President of his College Union at Jaranwala. Ten boys qualified for Category 'B' or 'C' in Gliding. Sabre supplied the School Captains of Cricket (Haroon), Hockey (Daud), Football (Ghani) and Athletics (Tiwana); while more than half the School Colours awarded in 1963 went to Saberities. The names of new 'Furians' are given at the end of this report.

We are disappointed that we have dropped one rung on the ladder and that Sabre have won the Chigwell Shield this year. In a way, they fully deserved it as they were after it from the very first day and worked very hard to win it for the first time in the School history. It was, however, not that we slackened our efforts and it would not be unsporting on our part to say that it was real hard luck on us to be disqualified in two of the Competitions, especially Swimming where we were coming first. Sabre were also lucky to have boys like Tiwana, Idrees and Qazi from the 7th and 8th Entries, while we had to be contented with the 9th Entry boys.

However, we were first at Drill, P.T. and Gymnastics, and Debating and equal first in Hockey and Basketball—no mean achievement. We also won the Gliding Trophy.

To give the story in detail, we started very badly at cricket as the Seniors' team was rather weak ; but Zafar played a determined game and did a good job behind the wickets ; while Feroze, Saeed, Azmat and Kausar were outstanding as juniors and now possess considerable skill at the game.

At Indoor Games, too, the Saberites took a lead over us ; but Arshad again proved an outstandingly good chess player and Rizwan, who was a junior, did well to win all the matches in the Seniors.

The Debating Cup came our way again. Pervez, of course, had always been an eloquent speaker, but this time Sikandar Malik showed considerable improvement and Tariq Qureshi surprised everyone by coming second in the Juniors. 'The pen may or may not be mightier than the sword', but the Furians once again proved that they can wield both equally well. We were second in Academics this time and once again our Senior Cambridge and First Year results were the best. Mushtaq, Feroze, Qasim Javed and Afzal won prizes in their respective classes.

At Basketball, too, we were first along with Sabre. It was a pity that Feroze, one of the best players in the School even as a junior, injured himself. Iftikhar continues to bring us laurels as the School Basketball Captain, and Zia and Bilal, too, have won their School Colours. In the Juniors Arshad, Ehsanullah, Kausar and Saeed Afzal showed considerable promise and the first two mentioned have already begun to play for the School.

We were at our best at swimming in that the Seniors alone won three out of the four races besides being declared the best diving team. Among the Juniors Shuja turned out to be a very good swimmer and Asif proved a veritable submarine in the plunge. Arshad, besides being one of the best divers in the School, has also the making of a very good swimmer.

At Football the Seniors' team was very weak; but the Juniors, led by Saeed Afzal, remained unbeaten. Azim, Ehsanullah, Feroze, Kausar and Fahim played a spirited and courageous game, while Farooq Saeed Anwar worked hard in the Seniors.

Hockey saw us on the top again along with Sabre, and the Juniors, led by Ehsanullah, remained unbeaten once again. While Riaz, Iftikhar, Zaka and Kausar were the most prominent in the Seniors, Saeed Afzal, Ehsanullah, Feroze, Arshad and Asghar appear to be promising future players.

This year we won back our P.T. and Gymnastics Cup again and it is needless to say that Fury Gymnastic team was by far the most skilful and smart, and much of the credit must obviously go to Bilal for his excellent leadership. Out of the ten Gymnasts in the Founder's Day display, seven were Furians ; and Bilal, Zaka, Arshad and Kausar have won their School Colours.

Boxing pulled us down again ; but it was quite a consolation that four Furians, Arshad (Captain), Kausar, Ehsanullah and Nasim won their finals. Arshad and Ehsanullah have won their School Colours.

At Drill we did extremely well to come first and beat the 'invincible' Tempestians, who had won the cup year after year. The Furians' turn-out was the best, they looked like 'soldiers' and Bilal was declared the best Junior Commander.

Athletics was a neck and neck race between Sabre and Fury and though they ultimately beat us because of some superior athletes, it was quite a gallant fight put up by the Furians. Feroze, who was declared the second best athlete in the Juniors, was unlucky to miss a new record in the Discus as a result of being disqualified. Yasin, once again, put up a wonderful show by clearing 8 ft. 6 inches at Pole Vault at his young age. The way Ehsanullah won the Medley will be remembered for years to come.

The uneven ratio between Seniors and Juniors of the last year continued this year too. Of the 63 members of the House only 16 were Seniors in the first term and 17 in the second term. At one time there were as few as twelve Seniors. This was a great handicap and some indifferent players had to be included in the Senior teams.

Though the points secured for the Chigwell Shield were more than last year, our position remained unchanged. The only consolation was that we led the House below us by a wide margin of 23 points. To sum up, we were Champions in Swimming and Boxing and runners up in Cricket, Indoor Games, Football and Drill.

Winning at games is not the only criterion by which a House should be judged. Discipline, punctuality, confidence, leadership qualities, manners, courtesy, smart turn-out and the like are the qualities of a good Public School product, and we can claim that we are second to none in these respects.

Talking first of games, our Senior Cricket team won two of the three matches. Our Junior team was very good, but on the last day of the last match, when the championship was in the balance, though they did dispose of the Sabre Juniors for a meagre 20, the excitement proved too much for them to score the necessary runs and we had to be content with the second position. Similarly in Football, our Seniors were unbeaten but the Juniors lost against Sabre and this cost us the cup.

We had been losing Swimming by a narrow margin for the last two years, but regular practice and determination resulted in the achievement of our coveted end and we won the Championship. This was due mainly to the efforts of Irshad, Jamal, Shafqat, Jabbar, Qayyum and Naeem. Irshad and Jamal were declared the 2nd and 3rd Best Swimmers of the School respectively.

We again maintained our superiority in Boxing. As many as nine boxers of the House reached the finals and finally Irshad, Razi, Helal and Naeem won their weight Championship. The prizes were awarded, immediately after the competition, by the C-in-C, Air Marshal Asghar Khan, H.Q.A., the Guest of Honour, who was also kind enough to give us the honour of having a photograph with him, which appears elsewhere in this issue.

In P.T. our standard was very high as usual and we were placed first, but as this is bracketed with Gymnastics, which is not our event, the trophy was awarded to Fury. Sometimes it happens that we feel upset by an apparently poor judgment at some Inter-House Competition, and this happened in the Drill Competition. One of the judges placed our Champion Senior Flight last. Even with this set-back the Senior Flight secured the maximum points amongst all eight flights entered for the competition, but we lost the trophy by one quarter of a point, the final points being Fury 270½, Tempest 270½. Irshad, our Senior Flight Commander, was judged the best Commander. This trophy had been won by us successively since its inception in 1959, and we are sorry to lose it under these circumstances.

In other events we couldn't get a respectable place but there were some excellent individual performances. Qadri, our Junior Basketball Captain, was the best scorer amongst the Juniors. He also won the first prize in the Juniors Inter-House Debate. Shamsul, although a Junior, entered as a Senior and outclassed all other Chess players. He was declared the Senior Chess Champion. Amin was the best in Long Jump while Wasim came first in the 110 metres hurdles. Credit must also go to Irshad, our House Captain, who ably captained our Swimming and Boxing teams and was declared the best Commander in P.T. as well as Drill.

Muqheet stood first in the First Year F.Sc. Examination held by the Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education, Lahore. Khalid, Khurshid and Mazhar won academic prizes in the School Annual Examination. Mehdi Raza was awarded a special prize in Geography. He has drawn a world map on the wall of the Geography room and has illustrated it with costumes.

The year under review has not been a particularly good one for us. In fact our performance in the various Inter-House Tournaments was most disappointing. Not only did we fail to win a single cup or trophy but we came last in as many as seven out of twelve competitions—a highly unimpressive record keeping in view our glorious past. Our best achievement was in P.T. and Gymnastics, in which we got the second position. The only explanation that we can offer for our series of failures is that our teams in most of the games had been rendered weak by the exodus of experienced and skilful players and we could not match the strength and skill of our superior opponents. It may, however, be added here that the Attackerites cannot remain in the background for long and that they are determined to regain the lost prestige and glory of their beloved House—may be this year or next. In the first term, out of five competitions we were 3rd in three and 4th in two. Our most unfortunate failure was in swimming. We had never lost this competition before, but as ill-luck would have it Ayaz Sipra, one of our best swimmers, could not participate owing to sudden indisposition and we had to remain content with the third place after a very close contest.

Although our teams failed to achieve anything, the individual performance of some of our players were commendable. Fiez Mehdi and Ayaz Sipra played extremely well in Cricket, Basketball and Indoor Games, while Akhtar Kalam, Javed Saeed and Zafar Iqbal showed great promise as budding cricketers. Rafiuddin and Ghazanfar deserve congratulations on having won all their matches in the Indoor Games Competition. Kamaluddin Mahmood once again demonstrated that he was second to none in the School as a Swimmer and he comfortably won the open swimming competition.

We made a disastrous start in the second term by finishing at the bottom in the first three competitions, *viz.*, Football, Hockey and Boxing. We somewhat retrieved our position in P.T. and Gymnastics and secured the second position but we once again slumped to the bottom in Drill and Athletics. Even our 'scholars' failed to keep up their noble traditions, and as if to avoid embarrassment to their brethren on the field, they too came last in the academics contest. Among the individual performers, Sipra and Hadi played well in Hockey, while Ishtiaq Bashir as the Boxing Captain left no stone unturned in giving the requisite training to his team. Masud Jamal deserves a special word of praise for defeating a more experienced opponent to become his weight champion. Ayaz Sipra was again in the forefront in athletics in which he became the School champion athlete and created a new record in the Javelin. Hasnat, Rana Javed Akhtar, Baqar Ali Habib, Mahbubul Islam, Iqbal Habib also deserve praise for their gallant efforts in the various track and field events.

As usual, some of our boys have been prominent in the various School activities. Ayaz Sipra has been a prolific run-getter in the School Cricket matches and he also did well in Basketball, while Shafi and Imtiaz have been regular members of the School Hockey team. Riaz Sarwar has been appointed the Secretary of the School Camera Club—a unique distinction for a junior boy. A record number of Attackerites (eleven) took part in gliding this year. Ten of them got their Category 'B' while Niaz Nabi had the distinction of getting Category 'C'.

Although it has not been a successful year for the Attackerites in the School, it is comforting to learn that our old boys have been doing extremely well at Risalpur. Zahid M. Rashid (ex-279) and Shahid Zulfiqar (ex-301) have both earned the coveted rank of Sergeant and A. Qasem Choudhry (ex-382) is a strong candidate for Cranwell.

The condition of the House has further improved. Our House Library, thanks to the efforts of Hasan Raza and his assistants, Rana Javed Akhtar and Baqar Ali Habib, is now well-equipped with colourful magazines, journals and periodicals. CURRENT TOPICS

This article deals with certain controversial topics which are very much to the fore nowadays. In each case I got the Principal to express his views, which I have, with his permission, reproduced here.

I. Should Boxing be discontinued at this School ?

Boxing is the only Inter-House event in which the majority of boys are reluctant to represent their House and have to be persuaded to do so. Boxing has now been abolished at the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, on account of the risk of injury which might render a Cadet medically unfit. This has had the effect of increasing the number of boys who think that boxing should be discontinued here. When an Inter-House event is unpopular with the majority, surely it is time to drop it.

The Principal was of the opinion that boxing should continue. He pointed out that boxing at Risalpur was quite a different matter from boxing at the School. At Risalpur, where the Cadets are older, boxing was far tougher and there was perhaps some risk of injury. But at the School the risk was negligible and there never had been a case of a boy suffering a disabling injury. He added that many boys were seen at their best in the boxing ring, where they revealed courage, determination and stamina which could never have been suspected from their appearance. It certainly helped in assessing a boy's character. The C-in-C, too, who attended the last boxing finals, had expressed the hope that boxing would continue. It was a sport common to nearly every Public School.

II. Should we participate in the Inter-Services Schools Sports Meet ?

This Sports Meet is held annually, the Schools participating being Hasanabdal, Jhelum, Petaro and sometimes Lower Topa. It lasts a week and is held in the third week of December. The sports include cricket, hockey, football, basketball, athletics and boxing. The number of competitors from each school is limited to 40. Many boys feel that this School should also join in. Judging by results, our games standard is considerably higher than that of Lower Topa and we should have a good chance of winning the Championship. It would also be a pleasant outing for our sportsmen.

When I asked the Principal why he would not let the School take part in the Sports Meet, he gave some very convincing reasons. The third week in December suited the other schools because their winter vacation had started, but this was the time when our Annual Examinations were about to commence. Obviously we could not accommodate 160 competitors while the School was in session. Moreover, for boys to train for so many different sports at the same time imposed a serious strain on them

since many were all-round sportsmen. It would also interfere considerably with studies. The schools which did take part were finding this to be so and were beginning to doubt whether the Sports Meets were worth while, especially as certain unpleasant incidents had marred the harmony of the Meets. The Principal ended by saying that he was thankful that we had kept out.

III. Should boys from the P.A.F. Schools go to the I.S.S.B. ?

The Inter-Services Selection Board appears to have wrongly assessed a number of our candidates in the past, deferring or rejecting some who seemed to us obviously better than many of those recommended. As the Air Force spends a considerable amount of money on each boy here, these are costly mistakes. Surely the School authorities must know more about a boy than the I.S.S.B. can find out in 4 days. This being so, why should it be necessary for boys to appear before the I.S.S.B. instead of being taken—or not taken—on the strength of their reports from the School ?

The Principal obviously held strong views on this subject. He agreed that the I.S.S.B. system might be the best way of assessing candidates about whom nothing is known, but no one could seriously suppose that the Board found out more about a candidate in 4 days than the School authorities did in five years' study of them from every aspect. Moreover, boys here undergo gliding training and a fairly accurate estimate of their chances of becoming P.A.F. pilots can be made from the aptitude and keenness they show for gliding. The Board has no chance of discovering this. If boys from here have to go before the I.S.S.B., surely the Board should allow us to send reports on them ? It is not in the interests of the School to recommend unsuitable candidates who would bring discredit on the School when they were at Risalpur. The Principal also mentioned that every candidate who had been recommended by the Board, but who had received an unfavourable report from the School, had been turned out of Risalpur.

IV. Should there be a bond at the P.A.F. Schools ?

At the age of 12 years a boy cannot be expected to know for certain what career he would like to adopt. At that impressionable age he may show a passing interest in the Air Force as a result of seeing a flying display, or he may take a fancy to the smart blue uniform. But he may feel quite differently five years later when his special aptitudes have become apparent. Is it therefore reasonable that a parent should sign a bond committing his son to become a pilot in the Air Force ? If the boy eventually decides otherwise, he can always evade the bond by purposely failing at the I.S.S.B.—as some boys do. It is obviously not in the interests of the Air Force to have boys join who are not really interested. So what is the use of the bond ?

The Principal agreed that the system of bonding boys had obvious drawbacks, but when in the early years of the School there was no bond, many boys joined to get a free education at the expense of the Air Force without the slightest intention of ever joining it. The number who evade the bond by deliberately failing at the I.S.S.B. is comparatively small and in any case the Air Force is better off without them. The Principal added that perhaps the best thing would be to abolish the bond and make parents pay reasonable fees. The Air Force and Provincial Governments could give scholarships in really deserving cases. Gliding, aero-modelling and the constant sight (and sound !) of planes from the nearby airfield would probably influence many boys to wish to join the Air Force, and they would at any rate be genuinely interested of their own free will and consequently better material.

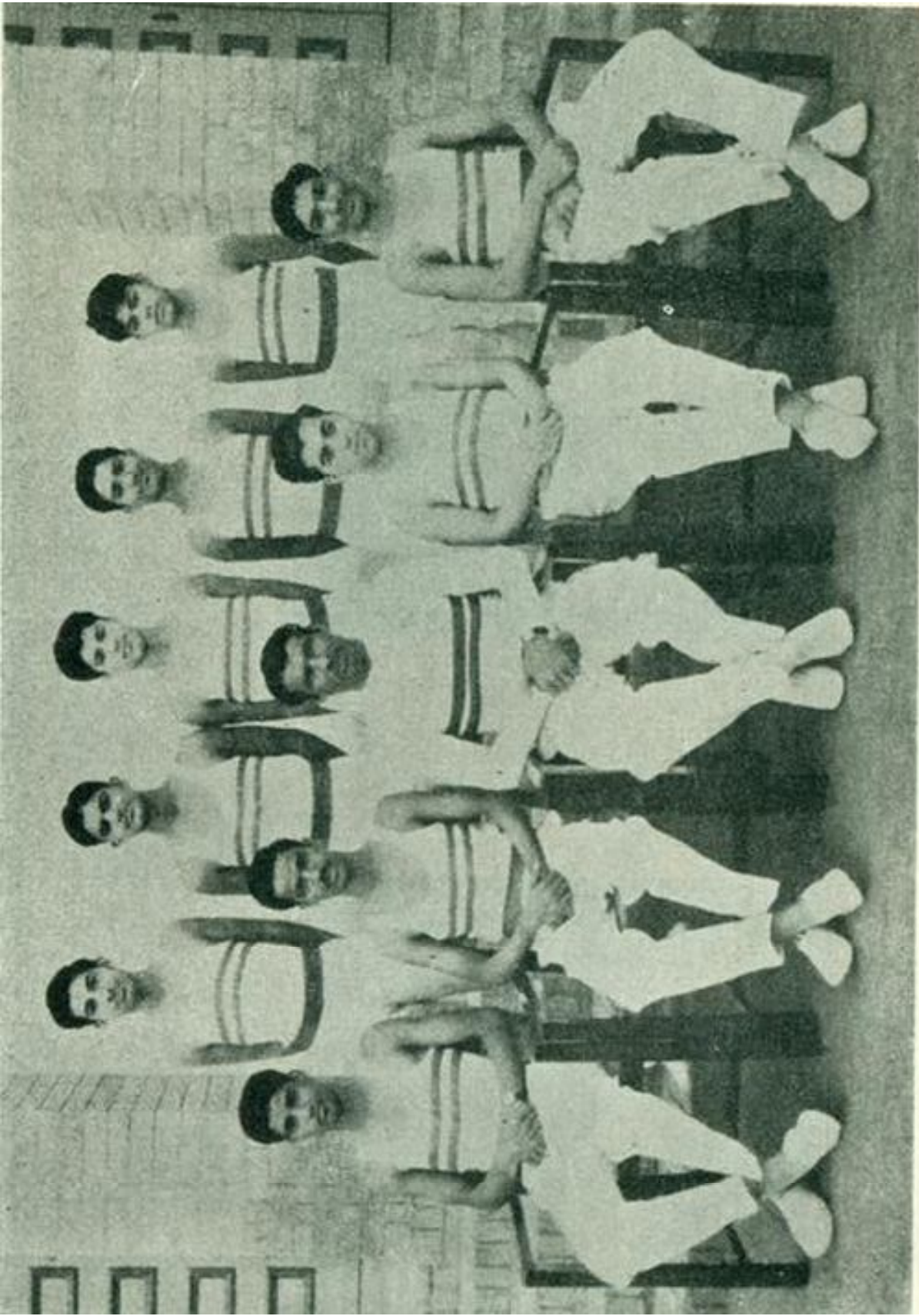

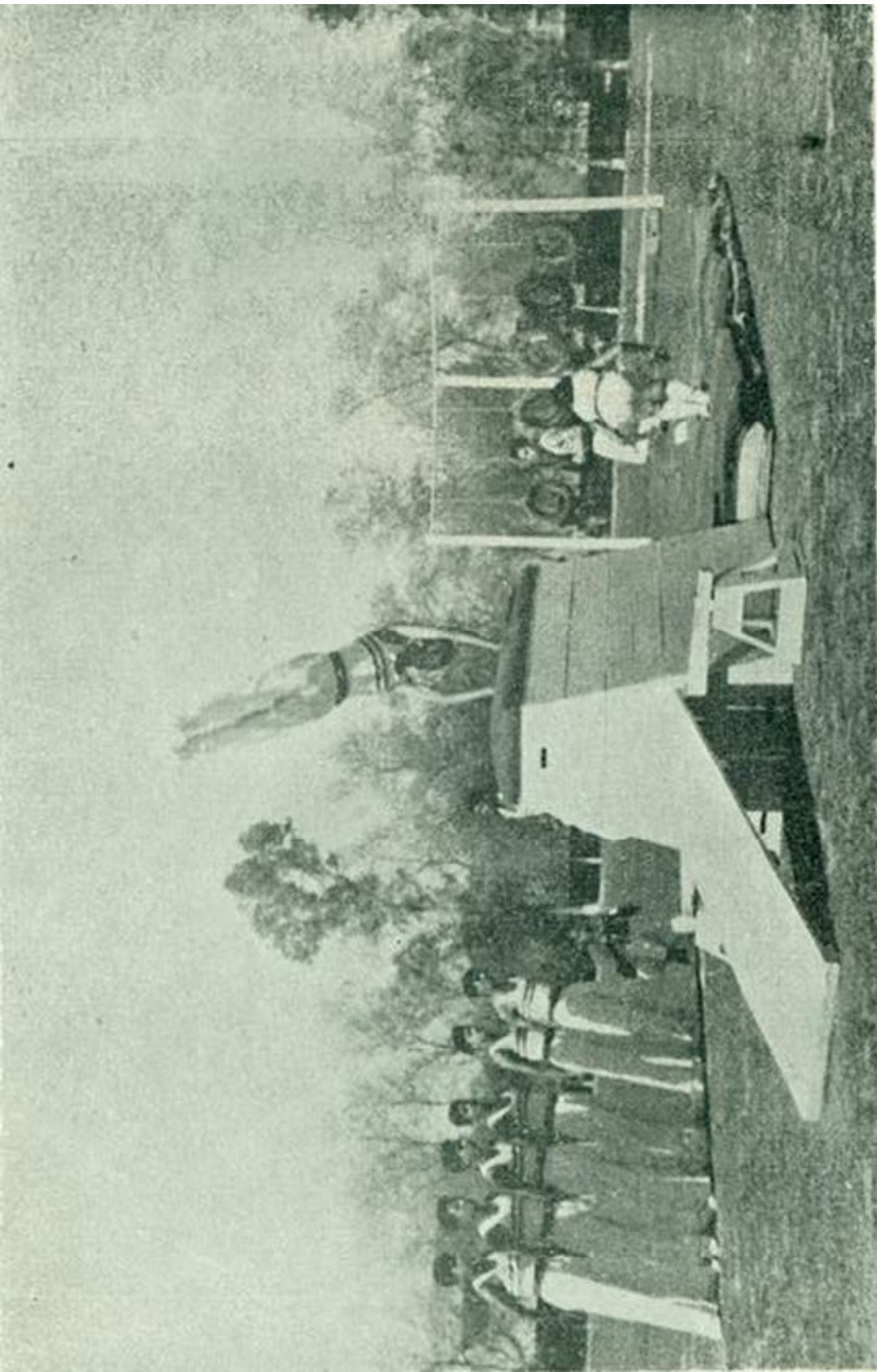

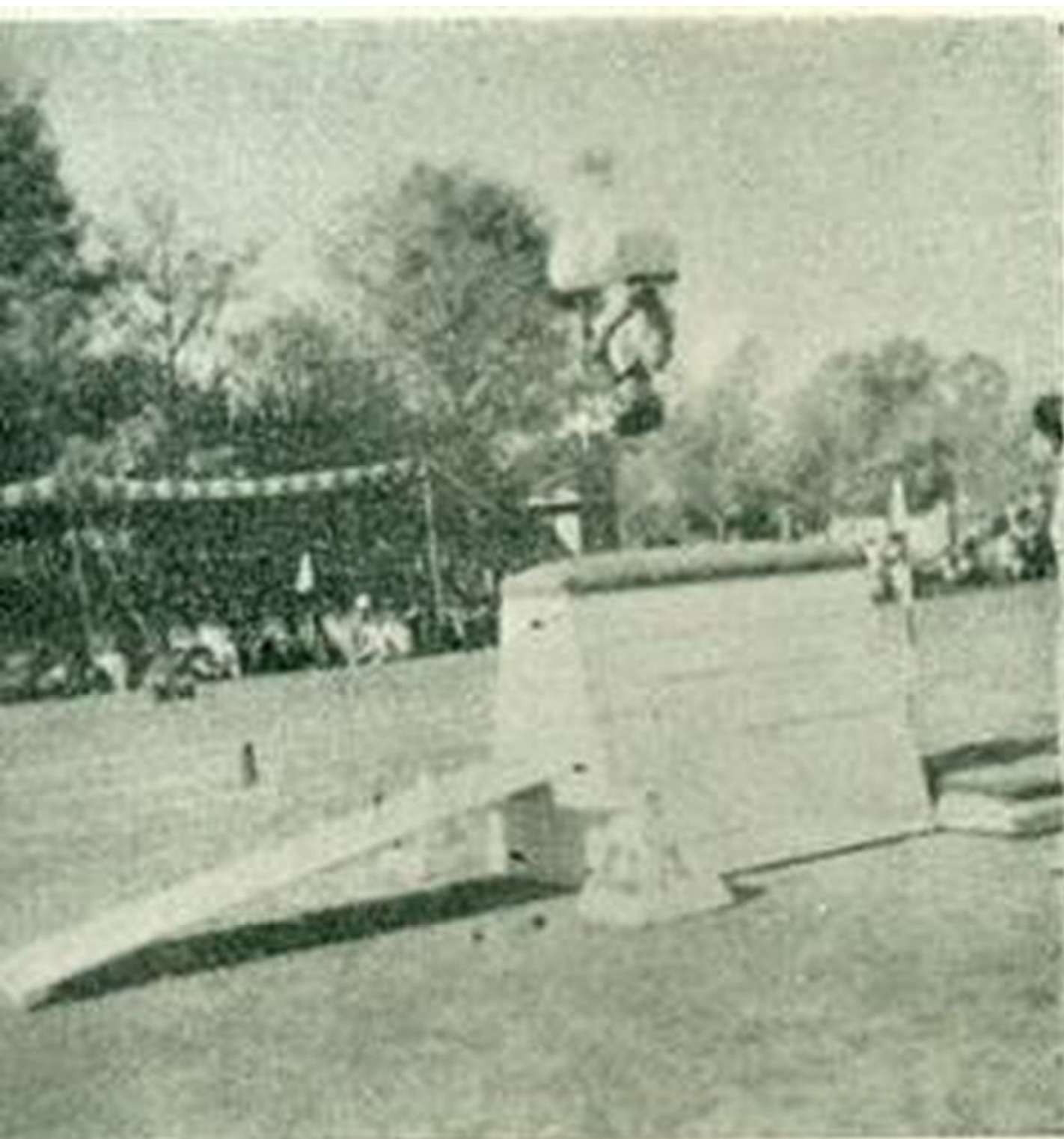
C-in-C with Tempest House Boxing Team. Winners of the Inter-House

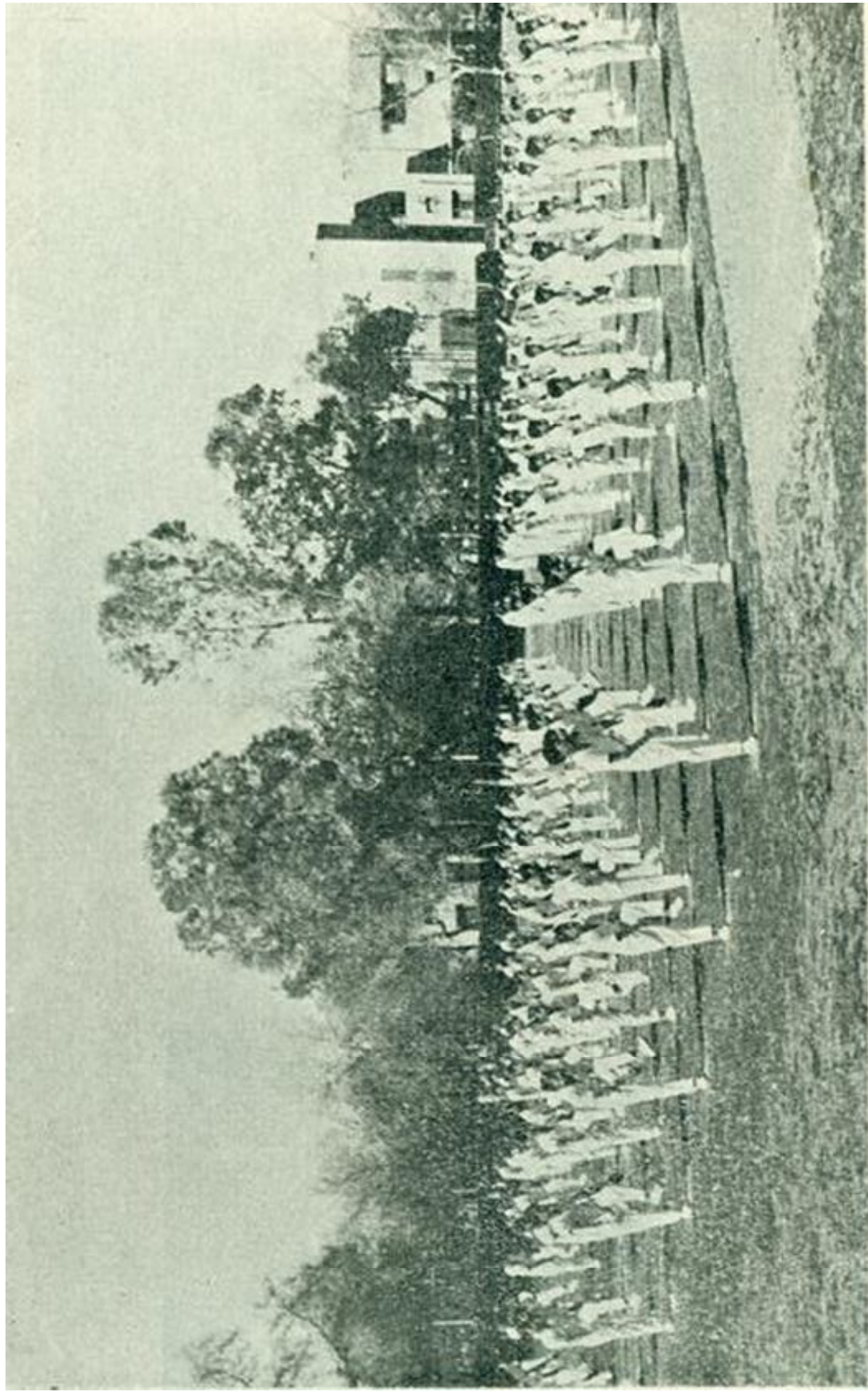

Then Warrant Officer Hussain, the aero-modelling instructor, gave a truly amazing performance with another control-line model, with which he executed 'loops' and vertical dives with complete facility. It was a fine show.

The School Gymnastics team of 10 boys then took the field with their coach, P.T.I. Ali Sher. The ground-work included a new item in the shape of a dive through a fire hoop, which all accomplished successfully. The work on the side and long box was, for the first time, executed without any help from the instructor. As this included somersaults over the box, this was a fine achievement and the team deserve much credit both for their skill and courage. Ali Sher showed that he had lost none of agility in spite of his years, and at one time he was so carried away by the spirit of the occasion that he did a succession of hand springs which seemed would never stop. The show was much appreciated by the spectators and was about the best the School has ever given, in spite of the comparatively young age of the performers.

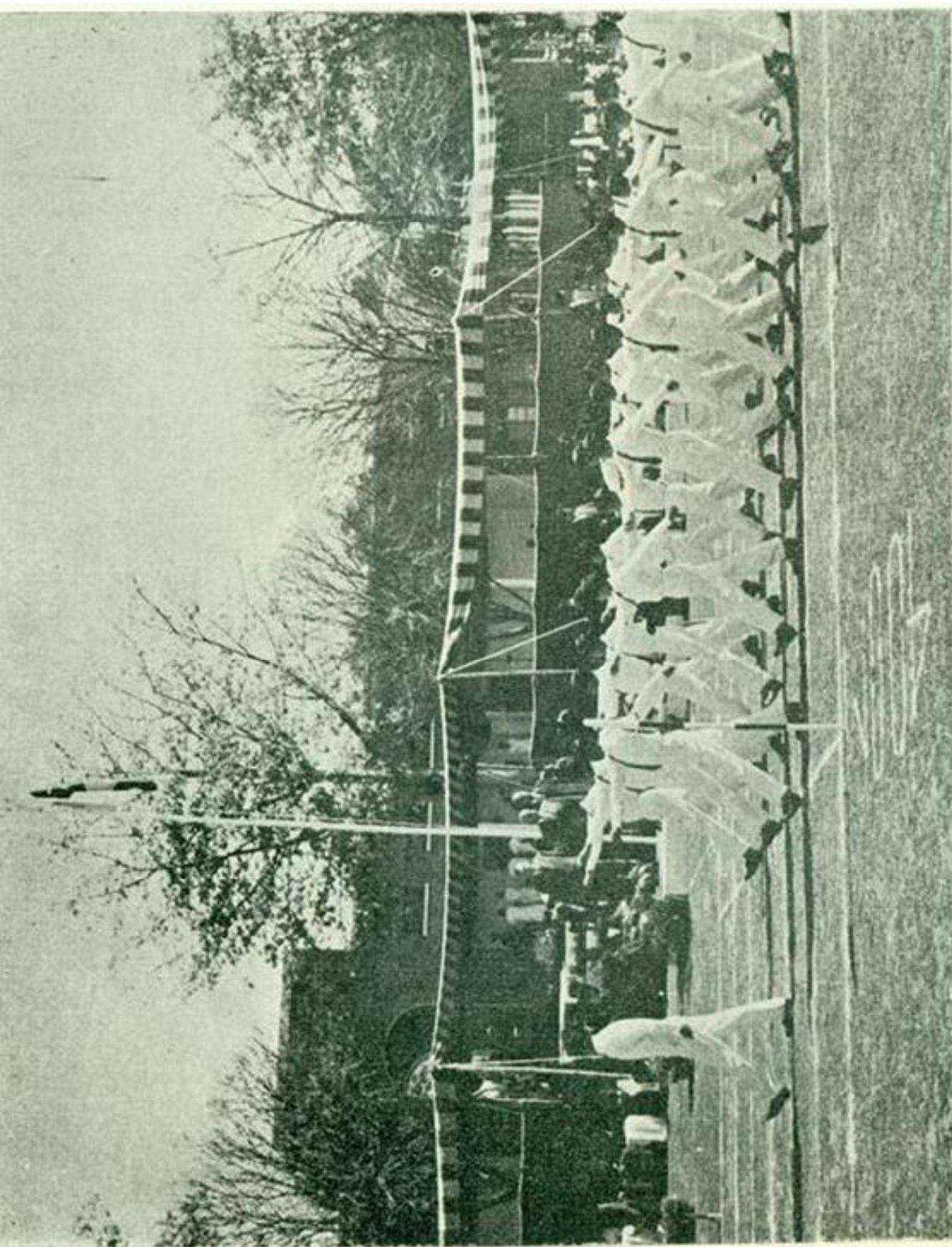
Another innovation followed—a mass P.T. display by the whole School. Some doubts about the advisability of this event had been expressed beforehand, but the Principal had insisted and had taken a personal interest in the event and attended the practices. On the day itself the boys amply justified the Principal's confidence in them by giving an excellent display—in fact, it was one of the highlights of the day.

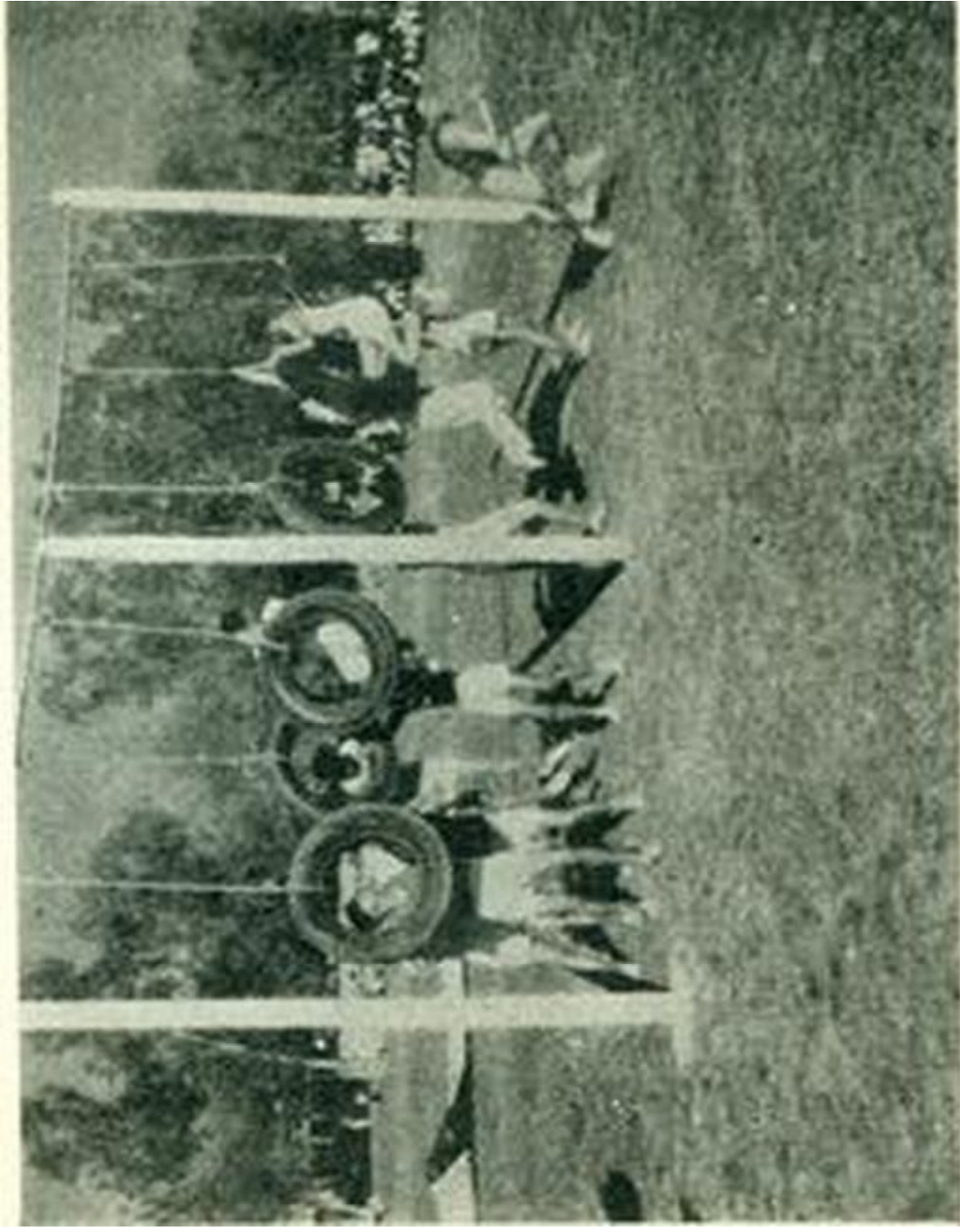
Mass P. T. T. Display on Founder's Day, March, 1964

The athletics events followed, Sabre House winning the cup with Fury runners up. A new School record was set up by Zillul Majid of Sabre, who ran splendidly in the Juniors 400 metres to beat the previous record by 1 second. The only Seniors' record to be broken was in the Javelin in which Sipra of Attacker bettered the old record by nearly 12 feet.

The next event was the Old Boys' Race, which was won by Qayyum (210T), now a G.C. at the P.M.A., Kakul, with Bakhtiar (161A) and Humayun (224T) taking 2nd and 3rd places.

Two more new events followed—an obstacle race for the House Prefects, which was appropriately won by Bilal (461F), the Gymnastics Captain, and a donkey race for House Captains and School Prefects. In this Ishtiaq (and brother) were first, with Irshad (and brother) a close second.

The Principal then read his address. He pointed out that the School was endeavouring to live up to its motto 'Aim High' by sending all boys in for the Senior Cambridge Examination and none for the much lower standard Matriculation. Matriculates fared very poorly at the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, compared with Senior Cambridge boys. A most encouraging feature of the year 1963 was the excellent performance of Sargodhians at Risalpur, where they had been consistently securing the first position in the College tests. The only two Cadets who had been sent abroad for training from Risalpur during the past year were both Sargodhians.

Thanks to the efforts of the gliding instructors—Ft./Lt. Akbar and Warrant Officer Hussain—a record number of 35 boys had obtained their 'Wings' at gliding in 1963. Circumstances had prevented the School from participating in any outside sports tournaments during the year but that there had been no fall-off in standards was proved by the ease with which we beat Lower Topa at all games in October, 1963.

The Guest of Honour then presented Gliding 'Wings' to those who had qualified, after which the academic, athletic and swimming prizes, and the House trophies were awarded to the winners. Sabre House won no less than 7 of the 12 House trophies in addition to the Inter-House Championship Shield, which they had never annexed before.

After the Guest of Honour had expressed his appreciation of the School's achievements and standards and had congratulated the boys on their performance that afternoon, everyone adjourned for tea. At about 5 P.M. the function ended and the guests departed.

In addition to the Risalpur Cadets, there were a considerable number of other Old Boys present so a basketball match was played that evening between the latter and the School team, the School winning 70-47. Next morning the Risalpur Cadets also played the School at Basketball but likewise suffered defeat. This was followed by a hockey match between the School and a combined Old Boys' team, which ended in a draw.

On the evening of Founder's Day there was a meeting of the Old Boys, presided over by Mr. Taqvi, followed by a special dinner for the Staff, Old Boys and the School. The Old Boys were put up in their respective Houses, and I need hardly say that all of us were as happy to see them as they were to be back here at the School again. We are looking forward to seeing them all again next year.

Gliding

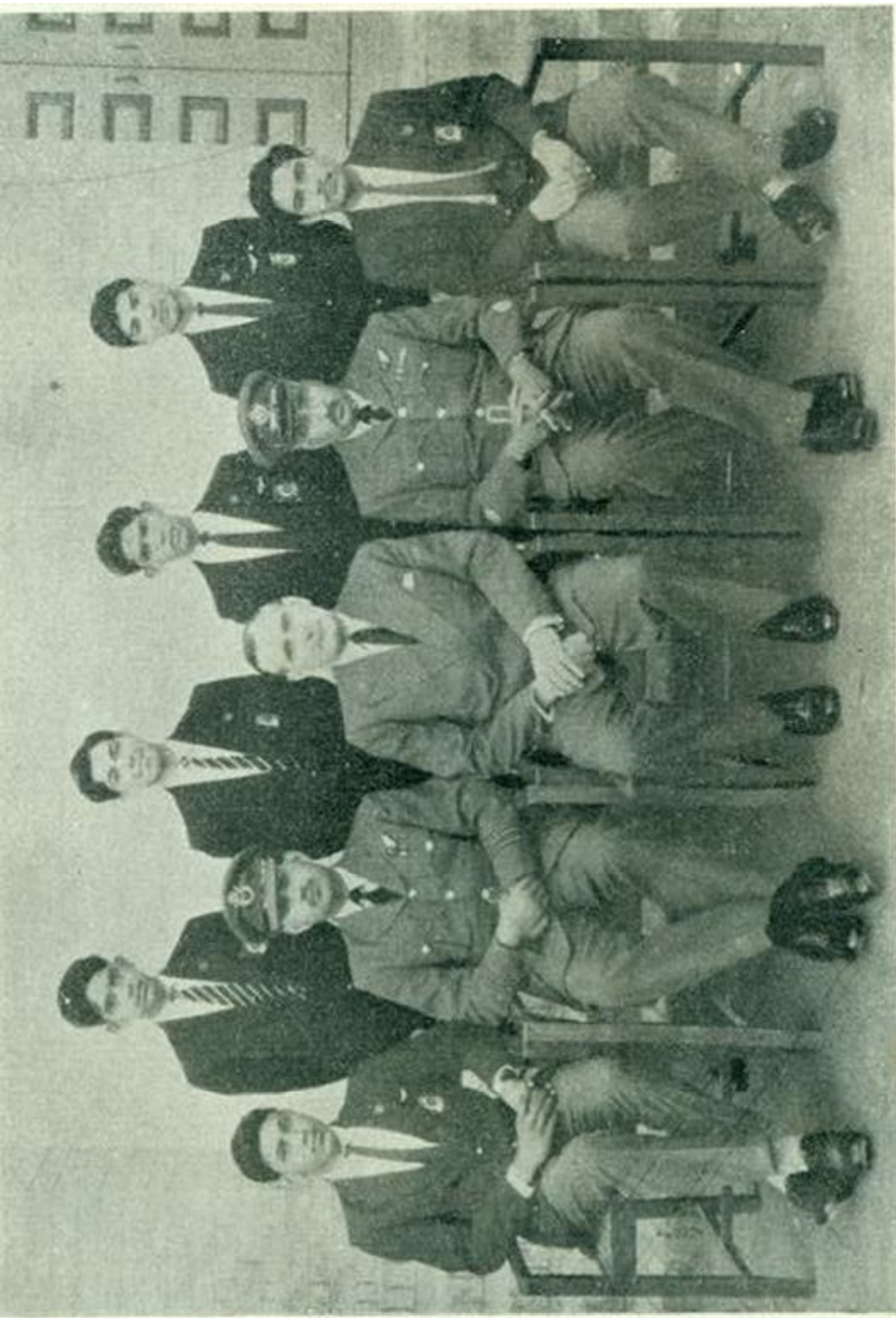

Gliding Trophy

The Gliding Trophy, which is awarded to the House winning most 'Wings' during the year, was won by Fury House with a total of 12, followed by Attacker with 11, Sabre 10, and Tempest 6.

Aero-Modelling

Owing to a shortage of equipment, there was less activity in the Aero-Modelling Club than in the previous year. The most active members were Sajjad (453A) and Bokhari (424S), who flew their control-line models on Founder's Day. Warrant Officer Hussain also gave a remarkable demonstration of 'stunting' with another control-line model.

Efforts are being made to procure a sufficient quantity of kits, especially for beginners, in the current year.

GLIDING—A FASCINATING PASTIME

We boys of the P.A.F. School, Sargodha, are singularly fortunate in having gliding as a regular feature of our training. It is not only a fascinating pastime but also a very valuable one in the case of those who intend to take up flying as a career. Any boy who doesn't get a pleasant thrill out of gliding must have the heart of a chicken and the soul of a dried grape.

For the benefit of those who don't know the ABC of gliding, I suppose I had better describe what a glider is. Briefly, it is an engineless plane. It has the same controls as an ordinary aeroplane, namely elevators which cause it to ascend and descend, ailerons which cause it to bank when turning, and a rudder to make it turn right or left. The first two are controlled by the joystick and the third by pedals moved by the feet. The glider has one central wheel and a tail-skid.

To get the glider in the air it is attached to a towing vehicle by a cable which is usually 1000-1200 feet long. On a signal being given, the vehicle moves very slowly until the cable becomes taut. Then a further signal is given and the vehicle speeds up to about 45 m.p.h. When the pilot of the glider feels that he has sufficient speed, he eases the stick back and the glider leaves the ground. It climbs steadily under tow until the towing vehicle reaches the end of the runway and has to slow down. The pilot then pulls the cable release mechanism and the glider is free. The height of the glider at the time of release varies between 600 and 1000 feet according to wind conditions. After release, the pilot circles round for two or three minutes, losing height all the time, and then comes in to land on the runway. The normal gliding speed is about 40 m.p.h. but when landing the speed is increased to about 50 m.p.h. The glider runs on its wheel about 100 yards before coming to rest.

At the School we have two types of glider—the Tandem Tutor and the Swallow. The former, a two-seater glider with dual controls, is used for instruction, the pupil sitting in the front seat and the instructor in the rear. The Swallow is a single-seater and is used by boys after they have finished their instruction and have been solo in the Tutor.

Boys are normally given gliding instruction when they are in the 10th and Senior Cambridge Classes, when they have been at the School for about 3 years and are about 15-16 years of age. The number of times a boy has to go up with the instructor before going solo varies considerably according to the boy's aptitude. Some boys have been solo after less than 20 'sorties' with the instructor, while others exceed 50. The average number works out at about 30.

The most exciting moment in the training is, of course, when a boy does his first solo. If all goes well and he makes a good landing, he is awarded his 'Wings' or Category 'B'. But if he makes a bad landing the award of 'Wings' is postponed. This, however, seldom happens as the instructor is careful not to risk letting a boy go solo until he is pretty sure to come down safely. Only once has there been an accident worth the name, when a boy on his first solo got panicky, lost control and landed in low trees near the runway. The glider was reduced nearly to matchwood but the boy escaped with nothing worse than a few scratches. This safety record reflects much credit on the skill and judgment of our instructors.

Although the most exciting moment for the pupil comes when he does his first solo flight, the real pleasure and thrill of gliding come when a boy exchanges the heavier dual seater 'Tutor' for the lighter single-seater 'Swallow'. In this he has a chance of rising instead of descending after releasing the towing cable. This he can do if he manages to get into an up-current of hot air, called a thermal. If he can, by making use of these up-currents, stay in the air for 10 minutes before landing, he is awarded his Category 'C'. But the really skilful, or lucky, pilot may stay up for hours and reach a great height. The present record for a boy at this School is held by Mohd Humayun Khan (224T), who stayed up for 4 hours 36 minutes and gained a height of over 14,000 feet. Tariq (288S) also exceeded 4 hours, while quite a number have exceeded 3 hours. It doesn't require much imagination to understand the terrific thrill one gets gliding silently about at a great height above the earth's surface. It is a wonderful feeling.

That a boy who proves good at gliding is likely to make a good pilot of a powered plane is certain. It shows that he has a good 'feel' for the controls and good judgment. Those who have shown themselves the best gliders at this School have invariably proved the best at flying subsequently. Shahid Raza, Shaukat Khalil, Tariq Syed and Akmal Afzal—to name only a few—were exceptionally good at gliding and have proved equally good at flying.

ABOUT AERO-MODELLING

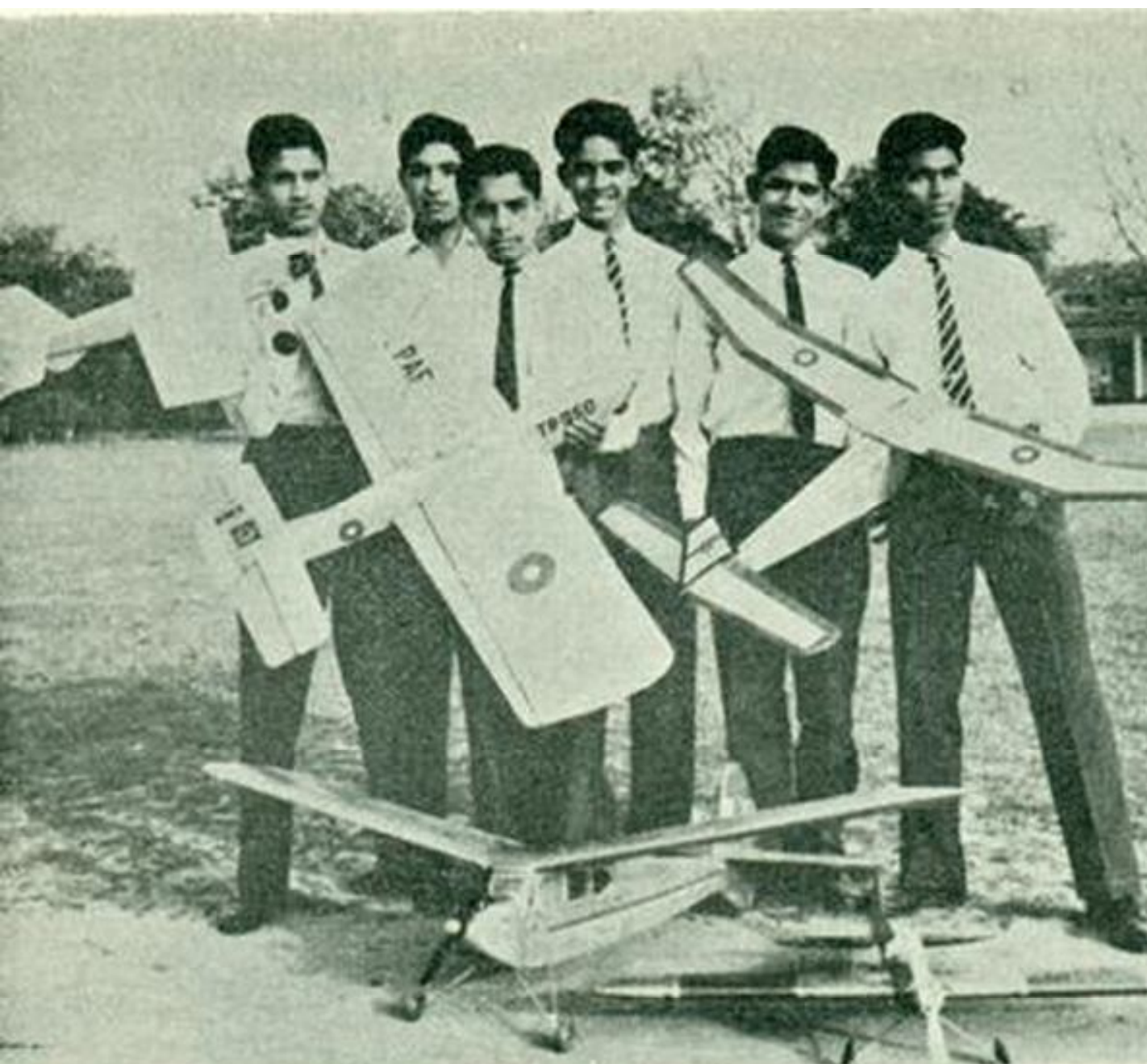
Some hobbies, such as collecting photos of film stars, have no practical or material value but serve only as a relaxation for the mind. Others, like gardening, provide not only relaxation but bring material benefits as well. Aero-modelling comes in the second category—at any rate for anyone who aims at making flying his career, for the aero-modeller has to know all about the normal controls of a plane and acquires a knowledge of aero-dynamics.

Aero-modelling is no hobby for the hasty, impatient type of person. The making of a decent model requires much patience and perseverance, while the cutting of the soft balsa wood into pieces of the required size and shape requires a very delicate touch. And the aero-modeller must not be one who is easily discouraged or upset. After weeks of patient, skilful labour he may complete a model and the time comes when it has to be launched on its first flight. Just imagine the worry of this moment! The model may crash within a second or two of being launched, due to engine failure or wrong setting of the controls, or it may be carried away by the wind and lost for good or fly into a tree or building and get damaged beyond repair. On the other hand, the model may behave perfectly and land safely after a successful maiden flight. What a proud and happy moment this is for its maker! Well, the aero-modeller certainly has to learn to take the rough with the smooth, failure with success. It's all part of the game. There would be far less satisfaction at a successful flight if there were no possibilities of failure.

The beginner normally starts by constructing the simplest of all models—the small glider—and gradually acquires the skill and knowledge to make more and more advanced models. Larger gliders are usually followed by rubber-powered and jetex models, and finally by engine-powered models.

Rubber-powered models are also quite light and usually fly well but the flight is only of short duration. The motive power is provided by rubber bands which run from the propeller to the tail inside the fusilage. When the propeller is turned by hand the bands are twisted. Winding it up is a worrying time, for if it is overwound the rubber bands will snap and this invariably causes damage to the delicate fusilage.

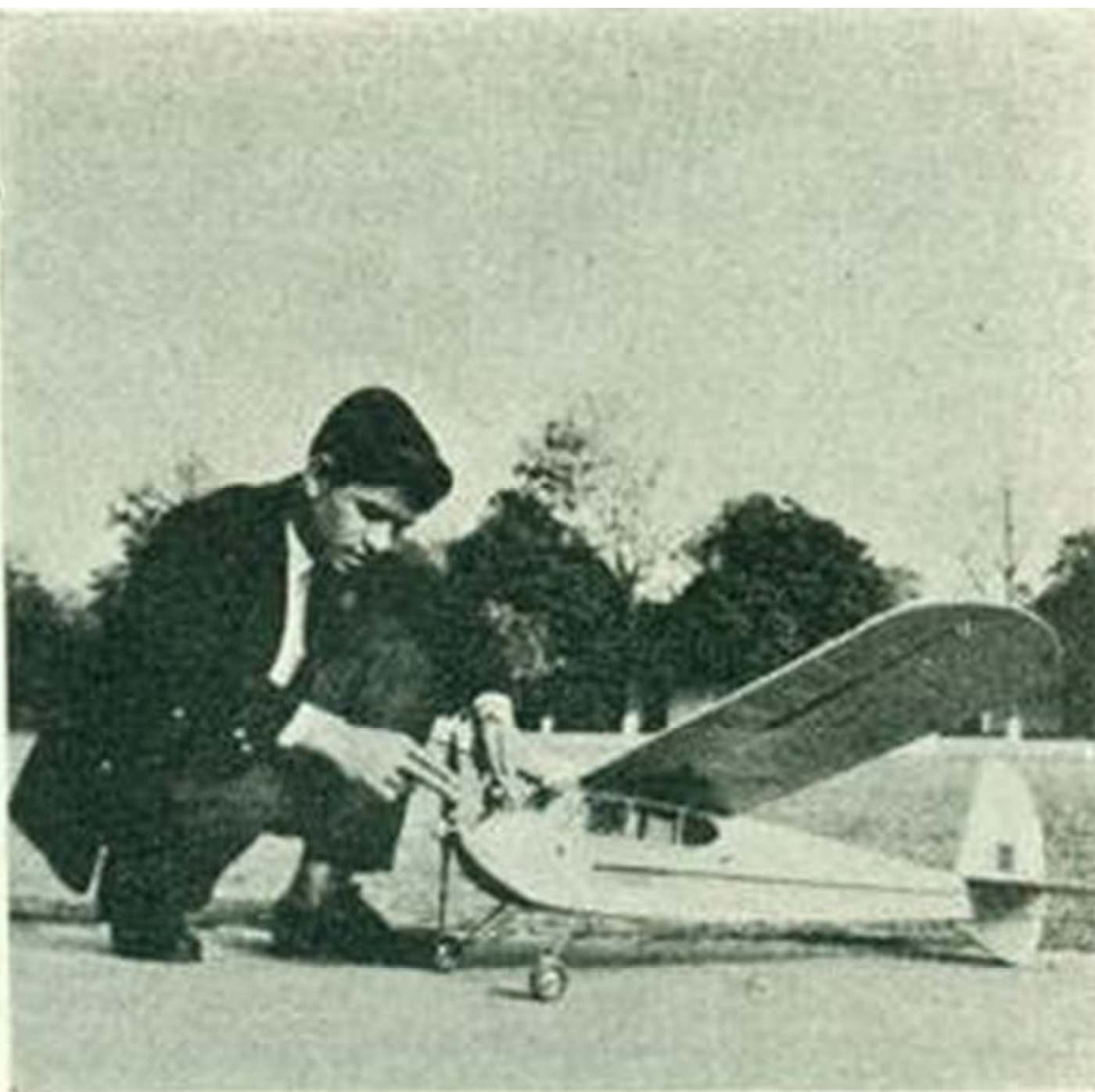
Jetex models are easy to make but require very careful trimming if they are to fly well. The power is supplied by a power-pack fixed to the underneath of the fusilage. The fuse of the power-pack is ignited and it gives out a jet of gas which drives the plane. These models can normally be relied on to fly well, and as they are very light, and the wings and fusilage are of solid balsa wood, they are practically immune to damage. The flight, however, is again short.

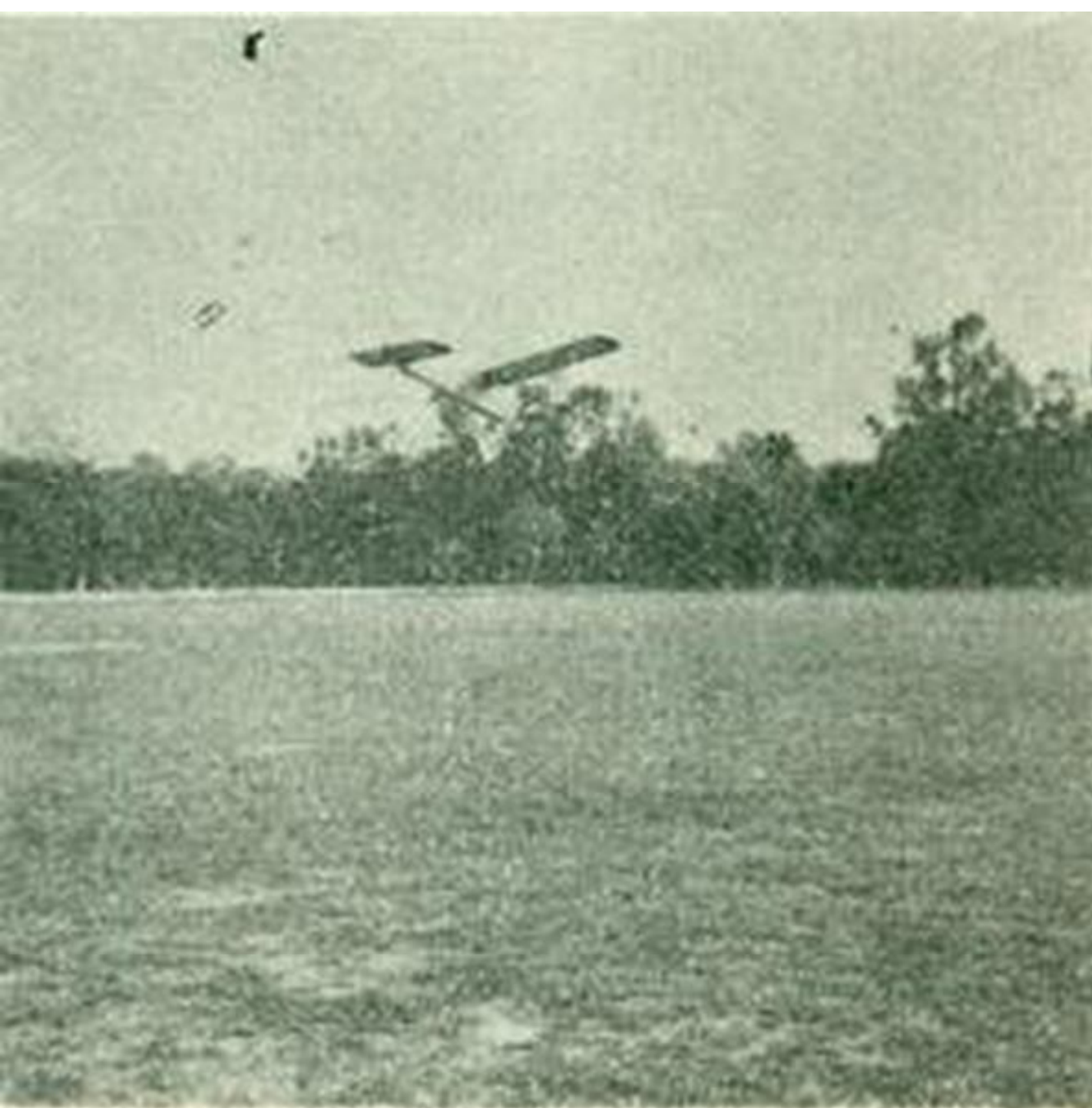
Control-line model about to loop — Founder's Day, 1964

But the real thrill of aero-modelling comes when one reaches the stage of making models which are powered by real little diesel engines, usually ranging from .5 c.c. to 5 c.c. These models require far more skill to make and they have to be stronger and heavier because the engine has to be fitted. There are two categories of powered models—free flight and control-line. It's a great moment for the aero-modeller when he launches his free-flight model on a successful maiden flight—to see it rising higher and higher as it circles round, to follow it on the ground as it drifts away with the wind, and to retrieve it from where it lands, may be safely on open ground or may be from some tree. To reduce the risk of loss or damage we normally take free-flight models to the aerodrome to fly, but if we put too much fuel in the tank we are likely to have a long chase, but the chase is all part of the fun.

Control-line models, as the name suggests, are controlled by two wires attached at one end to a handle held by the flier and at the other to the elevator of the model. By moving the handle, the flier can move the elevator of the model and make it go up and down as it flies in a circle at the end of the wire. More powerful engines are used in control-line models than free flight and they fly at a greater speed. The great advantage is that they can be flown in a small space and so it is with control-line models that we give our display on Founder's Day. The real expert can perform stunts, including looping-the-loop, with these models, but if by chance they crash with the engine running the damage is likely to be pretty considerable because of their speed.

Of my four years' experience as an aero-modeller certain incidents remain vividly in my memory. The worst crash was when Mustafa's (240S) fine large 'Southerner' took off from the athletics field and, after a precarious flight among the trees, flew at full speed into the water tank on the roof of Fury House. It was completely wrecked. Another memorable incident was when Sajjad's (453A) 'Skylon', launched on the air-field, got in a thermal (an up-current) and finally disappeared from sight. It was never seen again. Another of his models nearly suffered the same fate but finally came down near the School having been launched from the air-field. Another model which had a memorable first flight was Saeed Anwar's (366F) 'Halo'. It was also launched from the athletics field, but instead of circling it flew straight and disappeared over the thick trees in the P.A.F. Camp area. It was given up for lost but was eventually recovered some ten days later. Perhaps the longest chase was after Niaz Nabi's (432A) 'Slicker 50'. Its pursuers covered a distance of about two miles but they failed to find it at the time. It was recovered, however, two days later. The most disastrous accident to a control-line was to a fine model made by Tariq (288S). Two models were being flown together, one chasing the other, when Tariq's got out of control and dived full speed straight into the ground. It was a complete write-off. Finally I must mention a mishap to a control-line model which I was flying in the display on Founder's Day, 1964. It was quite a veteran, having performed in the two previous

years. After it had flown round for a minute or two, one of the control wires became disconnected from the elevator. This set up a vibration which caused the rudder to drop off and the model made a forced landing. It has, however, again been repaired and is now once more going strong.

WINTER VACATION TRIP, JANUARY, 1964

The 'unfortunate ones', as we, the East Pakistani boys staying at the School during the winter holidays are sympathetically called by those who proceed to their homes, turned out to be the 'fortunate ones' when the Principal graciously consented to our proposed trip to the North-West Frontier. Following last year's precedent, our programme was to visit the famous Khyber Pass, but this year's trip had a special attraction—a visit to the P. A. F. College, Risalpur, to witness the Passing Out Parade on 9th January and to meet the thirty Old Sargodhians under training there.

At about 8-30 A.M. on 8th January our party of 30 boys, accompanied by Mr. Taqvi, Housemaster of Tempest House, left the School in the ancient School bus. The School authorities had been unable to fix up accommodation, but fortunately Mr. Qazi, who had left our Staff a few months earlier to become Principal of the Cantonment Public School, had arranged for us to stay in his school for the night, while for our remaining time at Peshawar he fixed us up in the luxurious PDA rest house.

On the morning of the 10th we met Mr. Qazi, who showed us round his School, where we were particularly impressed by the Art Gallery. We also met Mr. Qureshi, Qazi's son-in-law and a housemaster at Lower Topa School, who accompanied us on a visit to Peshawar University, which impressed us greatly by its splendid and magnificent buildings. On returning from the University, we transferred our belongings to the rest house. We then visited the city to see the inevitable sights, had our supper and enjoyed a really sound night's sleep—our first for 3 days.

The next day was a very busy one. In the morning we paid a visit to the Warsak Dam, about which we had heard so much from those who had seen it the previous year. It certainly came up to our expectations. The huge turbines in the power house built in the hill-side are a marvellous engineering feat. One of the local engineers very kindly showed us round and explained how it all worked, so our visit proved as informative as it was interesting.

We left Warsak at mid-day and proceeded on our way to the historic Khyber. As we passed through this famous 'Gateway to India' I began thinking of the invaders and conquerors who had trodden this very route in the past centuries, and I think all of us were conscious of the same feeling of awe. The country seemed

very hostile and nearly every man we met was carrying a rifle. Small fort-like buildings were perched on high points here and there, and the general topography of the place was bleak and barren. The road was fairly winding and steep in places, and we were pleasantly surprised when the bus, making amends for its past delinquencies, safely reached Torkhum on the Pak-Afghan border. Contrary to our expectations, we found the Afghan sentries more smartly dressed than our own.

On the way back we stopped at Landikotal to visit the famous (or should I say notorious ?) bazar, where the quantity of watches, transistors and wearing apparel amazed us. We made our purchases, each according to the state of his finances, and then proceeded to Peshawar, where Rafiuddin's father had invited us to tea. So sumptuous was the tea party that most of us skipped our supper and retired early to bed.

On the following day, the 12th, there was no organised programme and we were free to follow our own devices. Some went to see a picture while others visited their friends and relatives. As for myself, I saw a couple of pictures, visited two places of interest, and then went to the famous Qissa Kahani Bazar, where I made some small purchases.

Next morning we had to leave Peshawar, where we had spent three very enjoyable days. Before doing so, we paid a hurried visit to the Museum, where the relics of olden times, and particularly of Buddha, were of special interest to those of us who had given due attention to our history lessons.

Having stopped for lunch at Nowshera, we proceeded to the historically famous Taxila. Unfortunately by the time we reached there the museum was closed so we had to content ourselves with visiting Julian, the site of an excavated town. There we took some group photographs before resuming our journey to Pindi, which we reached in the evening. We made straight for Chaklala, where our accommodation had been arranged. Pindi was in the grip of a cold wave, so the authorities very kindly supplied us with extra blankets which we certainly needed for the night was bitterly cold.

Next morning the sky was overcast and soon it began drizzling. This put an end to our plans for visiting Murree to see the snow, but as it turned out it proved unnecessary. The temperature fell so low that snow actually fell in Pindi—the first time in 34 years. None of us had ever experienced snowfall before, but instead of enjoying it we huddled close to the fire in a vain attempt to get warm. The weather cleared a bit in the afternoon and we went around the city. Needless to say when we came on a cinema we could not resist the temptation of seeing a picture, after which we returned to Chaklala, had our supper and went to bed—the only warm place. It was a somewhat disappointing day.

Next morning we said good-bye to Chaklala and, as the weather was reasonably fine, we optimistically decided to go to Murree. On the way we stopped at the Rawal Dam. Although not so impressive as that at Warsak, it is none the less a considerable feat of engineering. Proceeding up the hill, we came upon quite deep snow when we were within about 15 miles of Murree. We stopped the bus and had quite a bit of fun playing in the snow. We then went on for another 3 miles but the steep climb proved too much for the bus and we had to abandon the idea of reaching Murree. After eating our packed lunch, we sadly returned to Pindi *via* Islamabad. The new capital, however, did not impress us, but perhaps it is as yet too early to judge what it will finally be like. Let's hope the somewhat unpromising infant develops into a fine child.

When we reached Pindi, the bus had a thorough check-up, and it was not until 6 P.M. that we finally set out on the 170 miles journey to Sargodha. The journey was uneventful except for a stop at a place where plenty of snow was covering the ground. We had a terrific battle with snowballs, and even Mr. Taqvi forgot his years and joined in. Apart from this, we slept most of the way and eventually reached Sargodha at 1 A.M.

Thus ended a most memorable and enjoyable trip, during which we saw more places and more of the life in West Pakistan in eight days than we had seen in all our years at the School. In spite of the all too frequent mishaps to the bus, which should have been pensioned off long ago, we had a fine time and one which I shall not forget for many a long day.
